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# 1. District Profile

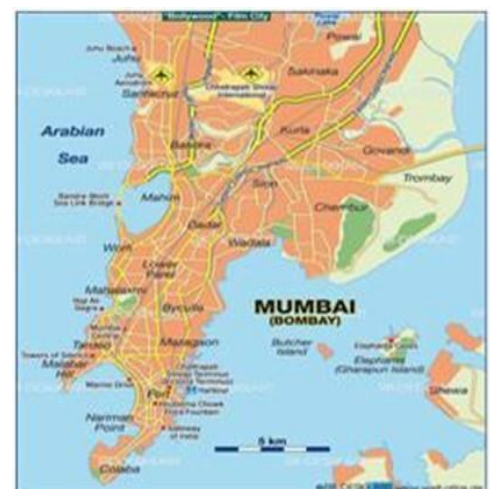
## a. Introduction

Mumbai Suburban district is a significant hub for trade in Maharashtra due to its strategic location, well-developed infrastructure, and proximity to key markets. It is located in the Konkan Division of Maharashtra and is one of the most populous districts in India, with a population of approximately 9.36 million as per the 2011 census. The district comprises three talukas—Andheri, Borivali, and Kurla—and is divided into two sub-divisional offices, encompassing 87 villages and featuring four parliamentary constituencies along with 26 assembly constituencies.

Economically, Mumbai Suburban District serves as a hub of trade and commerce, significantly contributing to Maharashtra's economy. Key sectors include financial services, with numerous banks and institutions establishing a strong presence, as well as a booming real estate and construction market driven by rapid urbanization. The district is also known for its vibrant entertainment industry, with Film City and various studios attracting talent and investment. Additionally, the manufacturing and IT sectors enhance the district's economic diversity. Infrastructure plays a crucial role in the district's development, with well-connected roadways facilitated by the Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation (MSRTC) and major national highways. The local train network, known as the lifeline of Mumbai, provides extensive services, while Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport serves as a major gateway for domestic and international travel, further enhancing trade and tourism. The ongoing development of the Mumbai Metro and Monorail systems aims to alleviate traffic congestion and improve public transport efficiency. Education is also a stronghold in the district, with several prominent institutions, including the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Powai, contributing to a skilled workforce. Culturally, Mumbai Suburban District is rich in heritage and recreational opportunities, featuring popular beaches like Juhu, Aksa, and Versova, as well as parks and lakes such as Sanjay Gandhi National Park, Vihar Lake, and Tulsi Lake. Historical sites, including the Kanheri and Jogeshwari caves and landmarks like Mount Mary Church, reflect the district's historical significance.

## b. Location and Geography

Mumbai Suburban district is bordered by the Arabian Sea to the west and Thane Creek to the east. Its jurisdiction extends from Bandra in the south to Dahisar in the north, and from Kurla in the east to Mulund and Trombay Creek. The district comprises three administrative subdivisions, or talukas: Andheri, Borivali, and Kurla, along with 87 villages. The district is characterized by a mix of urban and suburban environments, featuring significant landmarks such as the Sanjay Gandhi National Park, various beaches, and recreational areas. Major rivers, including the Mithi, Dahisar, and Poisar, traverse the district, contributing to its ecological diversity. The area is well-connected through an extensive transportation network, including railways, roads, and the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport, facilitating both local and international travel.



### c. Demographic Profile

Population of Mumbai Suburban district in 2011 is 9,356,962, comprising 5,031,323 males and 4,325,639 females, which gives it a population density of 25,357 per square kilometre.

### d. Climatic Conditions

Mumbai Suburban district has a tropical wet and dry climate, with a humid season from June to September and a dry season from October to May. Average annual rainfall is about 2,502.3 mm, with temperatures ranging from 16 °C to 42.2 °C, leading to high humidity, especially during monsoons.

### e. Agricultural Profile

Fisheries activities are prominent in Koliwad as at Cuffe Parade, Worli and Mahim. There are about 13000 fishermen families with population of 43000 fishermen and about 450 Primary Fishermen Cooperative Societies in the district and about 25 fish landing centers<sup>1</sup>.

### f. Logistic Infrastructure Profile

The main ports are JNPT, Mandava, Revas, Murud, Dighi and Shrivardhan.

### g. Industrial Profile

The Mumbai Suburban District has 220,267 registered Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) providing direct employment, 91% of the industries are Micro in nature. Mumbai suburban contribute about 11% of total MSME industries in Maharashtra State. These units are engaged in production of food products, textiles, metals, plastic, chemical, textiles, leather goods, and services sector<sup>2</sup>.

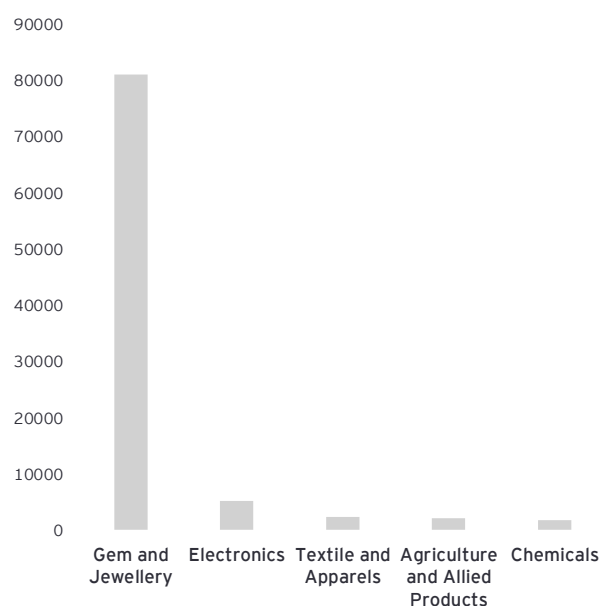

##### i. Top Exporting Sectors from District

Mumbai Suburban district, a key contributor to Maharashtra's exports, is home to several thriving export sectors. The district's exports are dominated by the Gems and Jewellery sector, which accounted for a staggering ₹81,148.18 crore in exports, highlighting its significant role in India's overall gems and jewellery exports, with Mumbai Suburban contributing 63.8% of Maharashtra's total gems and Jewellery exports in FY 23-24. Electronics sector contributes INR 5,332.48 million, indicating a growing but smaller yet significant market presence. Textiles and apparels, with exports of INR 2,490.74 million, show an ongoing importance in the district's export portfolio, while agriculture and allied products, amounting to INR 2,267.76 million, underscore the region's effective leverage of its agricultural strengths. The chemicals sector, contributing INR 1,943.01 million, maintains a steady role in the export landscape.

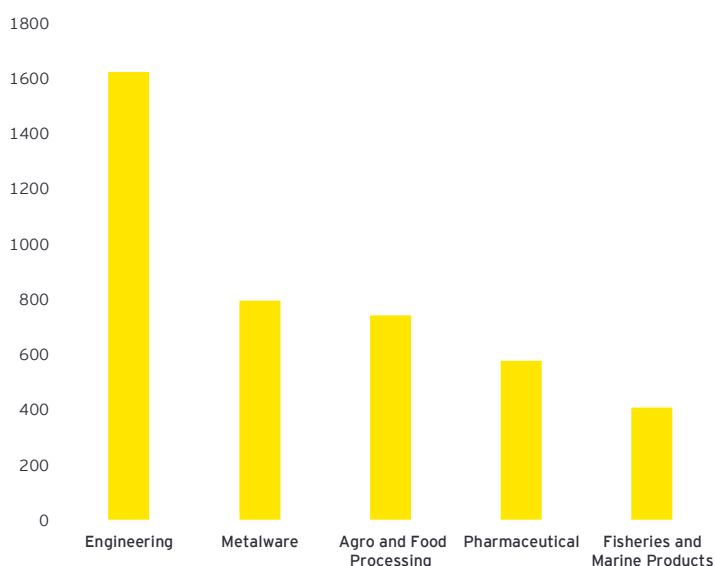
Top 5 Exporting Sectors from District (FY 2023-2024)



## ii. Potential Exporting Sectors from District

Mumbai Suburban district exhibits considerable potential across various export sectors. The engineering sector, with exports INR 1,622.95 million, shows an opportunity for growth through the leveraging advanced manufacturing technologies and expanding into emerging markets. Metalware and agro and food processing sectors, exporting INR 796.02 million and INR 742.37 million respectively, could significantly benefit from strategic investments in supply chain optimization and market diversification to enhance their competitive edge globally. The pharmaceutical sector, with INR 578.51 million in exports, shows significant potential for growth through innovation and enhancing international partnerships. Fisheries and marine products sector, with exports of INR 409.07 million, presents opportunities for expansion through the adoption of sustainable practices and alignment with global food security trends.
